

WELCOME!

Thank you for joining us for our 2024 Green Team Summit! Since 2003, Georgia Interfaith Power and Light (GIPL) has worked to inspire and equip communities of faith to organize, implement practical climate solutions, and advocate across Georgia on issues of climate change, environmental justice, and community resilience. I am delighted that you have come alongside us in this work today, and I thank you for being a vital part of this interfaith community of environmental activists!

Our theme for this year's summit is "Rooted In Resilience." In 2023, as a part of our 20th Anniversary, GIPL went through a strategic planning process with a primary question in mind: "What will the next 20 years require of us?" After discernment and community conversation, we decided while it is true that we must continue to take action to limit greenhouse gas emissions, we must **also** prepare our communities to weather the effects of a warming world. In short, to be more resilient. This is not easy work. This work requires that every single one of us plunge our hands into the soil, wherever we are, to grow something *new*!

To date, GIPL is in partnership with over 100 Green Teams, many of you present today, as well as hundreds more who participate in GIPL events, workshops, and programming annually. We believe you and your faith communities have the power to change the world and lead Georgia in collective resilience, and GIPL is here to help!

In partnership with Drawdown Georgia, GIPL will continue to expand our practical climate solution programming. In addition to our current programs in energy efficiency (Power-Wise), rooftop solar (Solar-Wise), Zero-Waste, water efficiency (Water-Wise), and electric vehicle (EV) charging, we will also be adding two new programmatic initiatives in 2024: A **ReWilding Program and a Resiliency Hub Track for congregations.**

We will also continue to advocate for policy change to rectify systemic environmental injustices and build civic resilience. Presently, we are seeking permanent protections for Georgia's Okefenokee Swamp, the largest blackwater swamp in North America, and the Blake Plateau, the largest known deep-sea coral reef in the world, just off Georgia's coast We are also actively involved at the Public Service Commission (PSC), seeking policies that invest in clean energy and lower the cost of electricity to billpayers. At the federal level, we are currently petitioning the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to release the strongest possible regulations for fossil fuel power plants to protect the health and well-being of Georgians. It is my prayer that together we will continue to be people who see all that is possible. The way that the world is, is not how it must be. We have changed it and will continue to change it together! Indeed, we are a prophetic people, people who seek the flourishing of every living thing, and people who continue to testify to a way of being that seeks life in the face of injustice.

Thank you for your presence here, in your congregation, and in your community. May you be rooted in resilience today and in the days ahead!


KEYNOTE



JUSTICE IN ACTION

RESPONSE PANEL

How are local faith communities becoming more resilient? Why does this matter? In response to the keynote address, local faith leaders and a climate scientist will consider in conversation the important role congregations can play in community resilience. Panelists will talk about what it means to have resilient faith, how their congregations are implementing practical climate solutions to become local resiliency hubs, and why building resiliency is critical in a climate-changed world.

Avery Davis Lamb (moderator) is Co-Executive Director of Creation Justice Ministries, a national Christian environmental nonprofit. He serves on the board for The Center for Spirituality in Nature and is a Fellow with the Re:Generate Program at Wake Forest Divinity School and the Foundations of Christian Leadership Program at Duke Divinity School. Avery holds a Bachelor of Arts in Biology and Sustainability from Pepperdine University, and a two Masters degrees from Duke University; one in Environmental Management in Ecosystem Science and Conservation and one in Theological Studies.





Rev. Brendolyn Jenkins Boseman is Senior Pastor of Hudson Memorial Christian Methodist Episcopal (CME) Church in Augusta, Georgia and a board member of GIPL. She is the first female national co-chair of the African American Ministers Leadership Council and African American Ministers in Action. She is also the Executive Director of the Imani Group, a local social justice nonprofit, and is recognized globally for her activism in the area of Environmental Justice, having attended United Nations Conferences on Climate Change as a delegate.

Mark Papier is the Principal Meterologist for AT&T, a member of Ahavath Achim Synagogue in Atlanta, and a board member of GIPL. He holds a Bachelor of Science from Rutgers University in Meterology and Environmental Science Physics as well as a Master of Science in Geological and Earth Sciences from Georgia Tech. Prior to working for AT&T he spent over 19 years at the The Weather Channel as an award-winning Storm Specialist and On-Camera Meteorologist.

WORKSHOPS - ROUND ONE

GREEN TEAM 101

WHERE IS YOUR WATER?

When you are thirsty, must you walk to a well or do you turn on the tap? What aquifer nourishes you? To whom does it belong? The question of one's source of water begs us to examine environmental justice. In this workshop, writers Christina Toney-Schmitt and Shay Alexi Stewart-Willis lead a poetic exploration of water featuring poetry readings and creative writing exercises.

ACTIVISM AND BIOMIMICRY: HOW TO BUILD RESILIENT AND REGENERATIVE MOVEMENTS USING LIFE'S PRINCIPLES

Biomimicry is defined as "the conscious emulation of nature's genius," and Life's Principles are six main principles and 21 sub-principles, which comprise the deep patterns found in nature that have created conditions conducive to life on Earth for 3.85 billion years. Using the Life's Principles worksheets, workshop participants will be inspired by nature's strategies and leave with tools to help design a holistic framework for their project or organization. This workshop is led by Beth Remmes, GIPL's Coastal Outreach and Resiliency Coordinator.
